United Lutherans of The World



MORE than 400 years ago the eyes of the world turned to Wittenberg, Germany, where Martin Luther was proclaiming the principles of the Reformation. With pen and voice that could not be quieted he declared that the Word of God is the final authority in faith and life, that sinful man is justified by faith, and that all believers are priests.

Today nearly 3 per cent of the 2½ billion persons in the world are Lutheran. Of the 692 million Christians in the world, 10 per cent are Lutheran. About one-third of the 207 million world Protestants are Lutheran. Seventy per cent of these 70 million Lutherans are members of church bodies affiliated with the Lutheran World Federation.

In August 1957, the eyes of the world will turn to Minneapolis, Minnesota, U.S.A., where the Third Assembly of this Lutheran World Federation will be held. For the first time a world conclave of Lutherans will be held on American soil. Perhaps this will be the only Lutheran World Assembly to convene in America in the present generation.

More than 57 member churches will be represented by 700 official delegates and thousands of visitors from all over the world. They will come to worship and deliberate under the guidance of the theme, "Christ Frees and Unites." Luther's teachings on the freedom of the Christian man through justification by

faith and the bondage of the Christian man through love of neighbor are directly related to this theme.

The theme will also provide an opportunity for the purposes of the Federation to be advanced. As given in the constitution the purposes are:

To bear united witness before the world to the Gospel of Jesus Christ as the power of God for salvation;

To cultivate unity, faith and confession among Lutheran churches;

To promote fellowship and cooperation in study among Lutherans;

To foster Lutheran participation in ecumenical movements;

To develop a united Lutheran approach to responsibilities in missions and education;

To support Lutheran groups in need of spiritual and material aid.

The United Lutheran Church in America will have an important share in the work of this Assembly. All of us may help by praying that the Holy Spirit will use the Assembly to give us a clearer insight into the true meaning of the unity and freedom we have in Christ.
